CELEBRATION OF GIVING

With great excitement, the **Carl Tonjes Inspired Giving Award** was unveiled at the Foundation's 2023 Celebration of Giving. The award recognizes trailblazers who go above and beyond, without hesitation, and have brought about real possibility, change, and hope for Fond du Lac County.

We were thrilled to honor **Dr. Tammy Boudry** of Boudry Dental LLC and founder of Bailey's Gift Fund with the inaugural award. Bailey's Gift Fund enhances our community by providing training and acquisition of service, therapy, and facility dogs. (A)

The 47th Legacy Award was presented to the Fond du Lac Loop Fund and accepted by Loop Founder John McDowell. The fund was established in 2013 as a long-term funding repository for future Loop initiatives. The Fond du Lac Loop is a 16-mile bicycle and pedestrian pathway designed to facilitate a safe, healthy, and enjoyable way for citizens to explore the beauty of the city and to provide a cost-effective alternative system of transportation. The Fond du Lac Area Foundation established the Legacy Award to honor those individuals, families, companies, and organizations that have significantly impacted the quality of life in the Fond du Lac area through outstanding community philanthropy and partnership. GRANT MAKERS AND CHANGE MAKERS

When we hear the word foundation, our mind often drifts to the idea of money. And it's true, the Fond du Lac Area Foundation, like other community foundations, plays a vital role in distributing grant dollars to enact positive change.

But grants alone cannot solve all of a region's challenges. In a world where needs are constantly evolving due to local and global shifts, we must evolve, too. We must not only be grant makers but also **change makers**.

The Foundation continues to be keenly honed on providing generous resources from our fundholders, but to truly address the complex issues we face, we must employ additional tools. Advocacy and

strategic partnerships are just a few examples of the levers we must pull to drive meaningful change.

In our **grant making** efforts, we've continued to support youth philanthropy through an annual grant to the United Youth program, and we developed a relationship with the former UWO-Fond du Lac Foundation following the campus closure to ensure the Foundation's assets are well managed and their scholarships continually awarded. We also partnered with local municipalities and law enforcement to address needs ranging from parks and recreation to safety and beautification.

Beyond grants, we've taken a proactive stance to be **change** makers by joining various tables where important conversations are happening. The Foundation recently formed a committee of local nonprofit, business, and community leaders to purposefully address the need for accurate communication and promotion of Fond du Lac. As a result, the event Telling our Community's Story: Creating Purposeful Promoters was created. Additionally, Foundation staff are visible in the community. Whether serving on boards, volunteering at service events, or supporting local initiatives, we take a boots on the ground approach.



INCubatorEdu not only ensures a robust future workforce but also fosters a culture of innovation and resilience, laying the foundation for a thriving community. The student entrepreneurs emerging from this program are not just prepared for the future — they're poised to shape it.

INCUBATOREDU

Within the walls of Horace Mann High School, a transformative program thrives: INCubatorEdu. This initiative offers North Fond du Lac students a hands-on journey into the world of business, where their innovative ideas grow into tangible products and services. Guided by the Lean Startup Method and supported by mentors from the local business community, students navigate the complexities of entrepreneurship, from conception to launch.

Thanks to an annual grant from the Fond du Lac Area Foundation, student teams receive seed money to actualize their visions. This investment fuels the prototyping, testing, and eventual launch of their businesses. while also serving as pitch awards to propel their ventures further. The goal is clear: to provide students with immersive learning experiences and equip them with invaluable soft skills essential for success in the modern workforce.

The results of INCubatorEdu speak volumes. Student teams have achieved measurable

successes, securing local retail agreements, generating hundreds to thousands of dollars in sales, and even attracting outside investments. But beyond the financial gains, the program cultivates a vibrant entrepreneurial spirit within the community, nurturing the next generation of impactful leaders.

Countless prototypes and business concepts have been explored and developed since INCubatorEdu's inception, but one that has made positive noise in Fond du Lac is Hope on the Block. What started as a studentdesigned concept flourished into a fully operational nonprofit with three pantry locations in Fond du Lac County.

INCubatorEdu is undoubtably one of our area's top outlets for students to gain early, genuine experience in the business field and have the opportunity to enhance our community. The Fond du Lac Area Foundation is proud to support this home-grown and innovative program.

HOPE ON THE BLOCK

In early 2022, a group of dedicated citizens and Fond du Lac-based organizations came together with a shared vision: to bridge the gap in essential resources for those community members most in need. Concurrently, three students at North Fond du Lac High School, as part of the INCubatorEDU program, laid the foundation for Hope on the Block. Their original idea? To sell merchandise and donate half the proceeds to initiatives combating homelessness and poverty.

With the backing of the supporting organizations, the students pitched their idea - Hope on the Block - and secured a \$1,500 grant. The branding they developed was adopted, infusing both the students' and community leaders' spirits of compassion and entrepreneurship.

Hope on the Block took flight in August 2022 with the opening of the first essential needs pantry at the Fond du Lac Public Library. Guided by Leadership Fond du Lac and Team Hope, pantries were added in North Fond du Lac and Ripon by May 2023.

Grants like the \$1,000 award from our 2023 bi-annual grant cycle are a lifeline, sustaining operations and fueling growth. The grant allowed Hope on the Block to replace broken doors

on the Fond du Lac pantry, ensuring the safety of its contents, a tangible example of community generosity in action.

The pantries - open 24/7/365 - are beacons of hope for vulnerable populations. Through personal interactions and feedback, Team Hope has witnessed firsthand the impact of pantry resources on those struggling to find their footing.

Looking to the future, partnerships with nonprofit organizations underscore Team Hope's commitment to holistic community support. From weekly warm meals to community gardens, and plans for a downtown community fridge, their vision for a better, more inclusive Fond du Lac continues to evolve.

Hope on the Block remains steadfast, guided by the belief that sustainable change is born from collective action and unwavering determination. Together, we can create a community where no one is left behind.




