ON THE COVER The Fond du Lac Area Foundation planted its roots and operated out of the home of Carl and Delnia Tonjes at 169 14th Street, Fond du Lac, WI from 1975 to 1989.

Founding board members included Carl Tonjes, Allan Edgarton, George Becker, C. L. Ludden, Marian Petri, Bernard Schreiner, Ellen Humleker, and David Wilson.





Our **establishing gift** was a \$50,000 endowment from the disbanded Children's Home that was formerly located on Follett and Macy.

To **build a team**, Jan Schmidt was hired as executive director in 1989. In 1993, Sandi Roehrig joined the staff before becoming executive director in 1995. Sue Steinbarth joined the staff in 1995 acting as accounts executive and executive assistant.

FONDY 100 GIVES - 2024 AWARDEES



Badgerland Youth for Christ used their Fondy 100 Gives grant for the Camps Life program. The grant allowed them to launch an additional branch of the program at a local middle school. The grant was slated to cover staffing, training, program materials, snacks, and promotion.



Thelma Sadoff Center for the Arts used their grant to create a new (and free) entertainment and art event during Fondue Fest. The event was hosted in front of Thelma on Sheboygan Street and included aerial dance performances and an LED fire juggling show.



Rebuilding Tomorrow's grant assisted with fall prevention efforts, such as installing grab bars, bathtub transfer benches, toilet seat risers, anti-slip products, and night lights. The fall prevention program reduces the burden on fire/rescue, emergency departments, and healthcare providers.



Solutions Center, in partnership with the St. Katharine Drexel Shelter, used their grant for the Drexel Youth Empowerment Program to support youth that are staying at the shelter. This educational program connects youth to essential services and disrupts the cycles of violence and poverty.

THE J FUND

For Jan Schmidt, Taylor Park was more than just a neighborhood park—it was a second home. As a young girl, she spent her summers splashing in the pool, competing in games, and embracing the friendships and lessons that only a community gathering place can provide. She learned to swim there, and as a teenager, she became one of the original members of the Taylor Maids water ballet program. Later, she stepped into a leadership role, teaching lifesaving skills and choreographing graceful performances for the next generation of swimmers.

Her love for Taylor Park never faded, and her husband, Dave, knew just how much those summers meant to her. That's why, in 2007, the couple established **The J Fund** at the Fond du Lac Area Foundation. The fund provides annual financial support for the Taylor Park pool, ensuring that children today — and in the years to come — can experience the same joy and growth that Jan once did.

"When I was a tween and teen, Taylor Park was my summer home," Jan reflects. "This fund is my way of giving back to something that was so important to me. It will live on long after I am gone."

Thanks to The J Fund, Taylor Park will remain a place where children can make lifelong memories—just as Jan did all those years ago.

Since 2007, The J Fund has awarded \$18,347 in grants to support Taylor Park. In 2023, Jan Schmidt was awarded the Fond du Lac Area Foundation Legacy Award.

ELAINE & ROBERT MIDDLETON FUND

Robert and Elaine Middleton built a life centered on love, hard work, and giving back. Robert married his sweetheart, Elaine, on his birthday — a date he'd never forget. In 1960, they moved from Milwaukee to Brownsville, embracing their new home with open hearts. Both were dedicated employees of Allis-Chalmers; Robert worked 43 years in the machine shop while Elaine spent 37 years as a crane operator. Community-minded and kind, they traveled Wisconsin, supporting local causes. Without children, they ensured their legacy lived on through the **Elaine** & **Robert Middleton Fund**, a designated fund benefiting the communities they cherished.

As you walk the trails of Hobb's Woods – a treasured park in the southwest corner of Fond du Lac County – you will witness first-hand the power of charitable giving. The **Robert and Elaine Middleton Fund**'s impact continues to ripple across Fond du Lac County, thanks to a **\$60,000** grant that supported the replacement of footbridges in Hobbs Woods. The multi-year pledge, paid in \$20,000 increments over three years, accelerated the upgrade of three bridges, reducing the project timeline from six years to just three.

This grant not only transformed the bridges but also freed up budgeted funds for additional park enhancements. Visitors now enjoy improved trails, new picnic tables, and benches, all fostering greater community use of the park. The grant even made possible the installation of the County Parks system's first Little Free Library, encouraging a love of reading and community connection.

By establishing the Middleton Fund, Elaine and Robert created a legacy of lasting impact. Their foresight demonstrates how charitable funds empower individuals to shape their community for generations, ensuring their values and generosity live on.

GRANTS BENEFITTING HOBBS WOODS



HONORING THE LEGACY OF MADAME JOANNE THORKELSON

For more than three decades, Madame Joanne Thorkelson inspired students in the Fond du Lac School District to embrace the beauty of world languages. Her passion for teaching French, her dedication to her students, and her deep love for travel shaped the lives of countless young people who walked through her classroom doors. Even after her passing on December 26, 2022, Joanne's impact endures through the **Madame Joanne Thorkelson Legacy Scholarship**, a testament to her lifelong commitment to education.



Joanne's journey as an educator began after earning her degrees from St. Norbert College and the University of Northern Iowa. She taught French and English at Mishicot High School from 1965 to 1968 before dedicating the next 32 years to teaching French in the Fond du Lac School District. Known fondly as "Madame Thorkelson," she instilled in her students an appreciation for language, culture, and the wider world beyond their hometowns.

Beyond the classroom, Joanne found joy in gardening, walking through her neighborhood, and sharing conversations with friends. She adored her dogs and had a deep appreciation for travel, always eager to explore new cultures and experiences.

Her generosity now lives on through an extraordinary legacy: a \$600,000 endowed fund providing \$20,000 in annual scholarships. These scholarships ensure that young people with a passion for world languages can pursue their dreams.

Scholarships like these play a critical role in opening doors for students who may not otherwise have the means to pursue higher education. They provide financial relief, encourage academic excellence, and ensure that talented individuals can follow their passions without the burden of financial constraints. A fund like Joanne's is more than just a scholarship—it is a lasting tribute to her values and dedication to education.

The Fond du Lac Area Foundation takes great pride in serving as a steward of such legacy funds. By managing and growing these resources responsibly, the Foundation upholds its trusted commitment to honoring donors' wishes, ensuring that their impact continues for generations to come. Fond du Lac Area Women's Fund hosted a series of three Community Conversations, fostering collaboration and solutions to advance equity for Fond du Lac area women and girls.




GRANTS AWARDED AND GIFTS RECEIVED






FAMILY OF FUNDS
